B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides a basic understanding of computer history, concepts, and microcomputer applications using Windows-based computers. Topics covered include computer hardware and software, operating systems and utilities, the system unit, input and output devices, secondary storage, communications and connectivity, the Internet and the Web, security and privacy, ethics, and computer use in organizations. Through hands-on experience, students acquire an understanding of Microsoft Windows and Microsoft Office including Word, Excel, Access, and PowerPoint that are used in business. No prior knowledge of software packages or microcomputers is necessary. Keyboarding skill promotes success in this course. **(3 Cr – 3 lect, 0 lab)**

- Utilize insert/delete rows/columns commands
- Print entire workbook, partial worksheet, complete worksheet, or print to fit
- Utilize page setup commands by adjusting header/footers, margins, orientation, or formula version
- Create, format, and modify charts
- Access*
 - Create a database file
 - Design, create, and print database tables
 - Create a form and report
 - Create, run, print, and save character, numeric, wildcard, comparison operator, update, and join queries
 - Create and, or, computed field, and calculated queries
 - Create and update a table with validation rules and specify referential integrity
- PowerPoint*
 - Create, save, print, open, edit, and close a presentation
 - Select appropriate slide layout for situation
 - Utilize appropriate design template, animation schemes, and slide transitions
 - Adjust text attributes
 - Insert, move, resize, and edit images, illustrations, and media
 - Utilize normal, slide sorter, slide show, and notes page views
 - Check presentation for spelling and consistency
