



## MASTER COURSE OUTLINE

A. MUSC 1124 Austin CommUNITY Choir

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Singers in this choir study and performs a variety of works from the broad spectrum of choral literature. Instruction emphasizes healthy choral/vocal techniques, improved note and score reading, and expanded knowledge of musical notation, terminology, history, and styles. This ensemble rehearses a minimum of 100 minutes per week and does not require an audition. This college-community choir is a partnership between Riverland Community College and MacPhail Center for Music. MUSC 1124 should be taken by the student enrolling in this ensemble for the first time or after successful completion of MUSC 1123.
