B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Skills, rules, terminology and game strategy will be taught for tennis, pickleball and badminton. Students learn proper grips, rules, terminology, strokes and scoring for each sport through active participation in singles and doubles play. This course will introduce students to the basic fundamentals of tennis and badminton. Strokes, rules, terminology and scoring will be required at appropriate times during play. Students will be able to apply strategies to singles and doubles play.
