A. PSYC 1250 Abnormal Psychology

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an overview of abnormal behavior and mental illness. The format of the course follows the psychiatric diagnostic scheme of the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual, (current edition)* and includes a discussion of symptoms as well as the possible causes of and treatments for various personality and psychological disorders. Legal and social issues concerning abnormal behavior and psychopathology are also presented.

<u>MnTC Goal 5c</u>	use and critique alternative explanatory systems or theories.	1. discuss alternative systems for classifying abnormal behavior. 2. identify and discuss alternative theories and explanations for the causes and treatments of abnormal behavior.
<u>MnTC Goal 7A.a</u>	understand the development of and the changing meanings of group identities in the United States, history and culture.	1. discuss the implications of being labeled mentally ill. 2. identify and discuss the changing attitudes of the United States and other societies towards the mentally ill across time.

<u>MnTC Goal 7A.d</u>	describe and discuss the experience and contributions (political, social, economic, etc.) of the many groups that shape American society and culture, in particular those groups that have suffered discrimination and exclusion.	1. identify and examine the experience and contributions of the mentally ill to the political, social, and economic shaping of American society. 2. identify and examine American society's perception and treatment/discrimination of the mentally ill. 3. describe how diversity in age, race, culture, gender and class relates to understanding psychological processes. 4. apply psychological constructs to understand and improve intrapersonal, interpersonal and intercultural dysfunction with case studies.
<u>CS</u>	become familiar with the basic terminology related to abnormal behavior and psychopathology.	1. define and describe the terminology related to abnormal behavior and psychopathology.
<u>CS</u>	discuss the incidence of psychological disorders in the United States and the ethical, social, and legal controversies concerning care of the psychologically ill.	1. identify and analyze the ethical, social and legal controversies concerning care of the psychologically ill.
<u>CS</u>	describe and discuss methods of clinically assessing and diagnosing psychological disorders.	1. identify and demonstrate psychological assessment and diagnostic methods. 2. distinguish between normal and abnormal behavior. 3. identify the characteristics, strengths and limitations of the current diagnostic system (DSM).
<u>CS</u>	describe and discuss the symptoms, possible causes, and treatment for various personality and psychological disorders.	1. describe the epidemiology, etiology, assessment, symptoms, and scientifically validated treatments of specific psychological disorders.
