



## MASTER COURSE OUTLINE

A. PHIL 1150 Philosophy of Social Justice

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course engages the student in reading and activities that explore some of the most fundamental philosophical issues of social justice. Topics include an inquiry into the nature of the state, political organization, issues of gender, race, and socioeconomic status, duties and rights of citizens, and the proper role of the criminal justice system. Philosophical analysis will demonstrate the assumptions and theories underlying such issues.

- Philosophical accounts of justice (including influential historical and contemporary political, social, and economic accounts)
- The role of questioning and argument in philosophical dialogue
- The impact of gender, race, cultural tradition, and socioeconomic status on philosophical perspectives
- Theories of human worth and motivation (why wrongdoing occurs)
- Critical ethical analysis of the criminal justice system
- Philosophical arguments concerning “punishment vs. rehabilitation”
