



MASTER COURSE OUTLINE

A. SPAN 2002 Intermediate Spanish II

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course presents a comprehensive review and continued development of speaking, listening, reading, and writing in Spanish in accordance with the American Association of Teachers of Foreign Language (ACTFL) standards. Emphasis is placed on communicating ideas in conversation and composition in order to increase proficiency. Cultural materials develop an awareness and understanding of the arts, customs, history, culture and literature of Spanish-speaking people and countries throughout the world. This study creates a comparison of cultural, social and linguistic differences and similarities. This course also explores how the ideas and values of Spanish-speaking cultures are expressed in the arts and humanities within a social and historical context. SPAN 2002 is designed for students who have completed SPAN 2001 and/or can demonstrate ability to meet the required minimum learning outcomes specific to SPAN 2001.

<u>CS</u>	communicate in the Spanish language in speaking and listening activities using vocabulary and grammar specific to the course.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. sustain a conversation about themselves on selected topics of interest using vocabulary and grammar included in the course. 2. ask and respond to open-ended questions. 3. compare, contrast, express and support opinions and make suggestions and recommendations. 4. express agreement and disagreement with some explanation. 5. present student-created works on a variety of topics. 6. use aural, visual and contextual clues to derive meaning. 7. exchange feelings and ideas of self and others with some explanation.
<u>CS</u>	communicate in the Spanish language in reading and writing activities using vocabulary and grammar specific to the course.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. read and respond to selected materials on a variety of topics. 2. identify the main idea and demonstrate an understanding at an intermediate level of some supporting details of authentic materials. 3. demonstrate an understanding at an intermediate level of written and spoken Spanish on a variety of topics. 4. write and deliver presentations. 5. write compositions with some guidance on a wider variety of topics in any time frame.
