



## MASTER COURSE OUTLINE

A. BIOL 1092 General Biology II

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is the second semester of a two-semester course sequence in general biology. Topics include evolutionary biology, a survey of biological diversity, animal structure and function, plant structure and function, and ecology. This course includes laboratory exercises and experimentation that illustrate core principles covered in the course. Prerequisite: BIOL 1091.

One of these experimental components should develop, in greater depth, students' laboratory experience in the collection of data, its statistical and graphical analysis and an appreciation of its sources of error and uncertainty.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. conduct research and present the compiled information.</li> <li>2. explain how data is collected, recorded and analyzed.</li> <li>3. identify the sources of uncertainty and error in relationship to that data.</li> </ol>
